1. Welcome!

Erika called the meeting to order and introductions were made around the table. She set the context referencing the rural and remote region, acknowledgement of indigenous food sovereignty, extreme weather across BC and the future of climate change in our environment, and the many ongoing food security challenges and opportunities that come with these.

Erika spoke to the terms of reference and explained that there will be honoraria available for Coastal Agriculture Roundtable members, as well as travel expense reimbursement.

4. Role of the Coastal Agricultural Roundtable

Erika and Heather provided a history of the Roundtable and its purpose:

Connection to the ACRD and its agriculture committees but grounded on the west coast. The three other ACRD
agriculture committees are

- Advisory committee
- Development committee
- West coast committee
- ACRD Agricultural Development Committee 'Systems Change' grant overview
 - \$300K grant from Vancouver Foundation
 - Parts are focused within ACRD and there is a provincial collaboration
 - Goal is to increase influence of regional initiatives for agriculture and food security shift power balance so local voices are more heard in provincial programs
- 3 tactics in region
 - Collaborative platforms for community voice (e.g. this table)
 - Core funding to regional food orgs for example, increase capacity for Eat West Coast and CBT to lead and administer this table, core funding for Tofino Community Food Initiative
 - Core funding to regional NCN good orgs and governments
- Honoraria for community committees: some members are attending while on staff time of a big org, but
 others are self-employed or farmers, volunteers, and not paid to be there increase equity at the table.
- Membership the group re-visited the member list in preparation to update the list as required for the reratification of the committee at the January ACRD board meeting.

5. Key Areas of Discussion

- Waste management including seafood waste reuse for soil building
- Dire need of sifter at compost venues currently not usable finished product
- Issues and policies on foraging and over-foraging (Covid-19)
- Sustainability of local food system
- The 'growing cycle' of learning and doing, how to we acknowledge in our planning
- Simplifying easy grows
- Educate, make 'unlearning' in the context of growing among the history of residential schools a happy event with ownership
- Food sovereignty ensuring people have a say in their food
- Improving direct networks with Vancouver Island farms discussion
- Paid position in each community would be ideal for our region
- Larger scale equipment for community use like freeze drying could be a shared resource
- Have children more involved in the planting, growing and harvesting process
- Think smaller than our major grocery stores
- Tofino Ucluelet Culinary Guild satellites
- ACRD and Alberni Farmer's Institute a source of connection

6. Review of Roundtable Strategic Plans

- Participants worked in small groups to review priorities and goals outlined in the Strategic Plan
- The top two key priorities identified were
 - Supporting and increasing food production projects
 - How to take advantage of local knowledge and expertise and find gaps
 - Infrastructure funds
 - 'business case' being realistic about what to grow and for who
 - Understanding value study of how community supported growing can decrease food costs
 - o Building relationships, particularly in the region
 - How can we get dedicated human resources?
 (noted that currently we have ACRD Support Worker part time in Port Alberni, Eat West Coast 15 hours per week, Traditional Food Coordinators Ahousaht and Yuułu?ił?atḥ working on growing projects)

- Role of EWC in 'matchmaking' needs to local resources and expertise
- Suggestions of more meetings, longer meetings, or meetings with other areas of food security to be explored more in the spring
- Erika will be taking away the discussion and updating the Strategic Plan to be reviewed by the group to inform work going forward in 2023
